

Correction Abbreviations Glossary

&	=	"and"
@	=	"each" or "at" (six tons of cotton @ \$200 per ton)
aka	=	also known as, alias (Pres. Lyndon Johnson, aka LBJ)
awk	=	AWKWARD, CLUMSY; RE-PHRASE THIS
c.	=	century (e.g., 19th c. = the nineteenth century = 1800s)
cf.	=	"compare with" (cf. Vietnam with the Gulf War)
cite	=	"What is your source (or citation) for this statement?"
def.	=	definition or define (e.g., Def. sweet: the opposite of sour)
emph.	=	emphasis, emphasize (w/emph. = "with emphasis on. . .")
e.g.,	=	<i>exempli gratia</i> ("for example" = For "The weather is good"; e.g., "The sun is shining bright.")
gen.	=	an overly general, non-specific statement. A suggestion will usually follow this symbol.
gr	=	grammar
graph	=	paragraph (SEE ALSO gr)
i.e.,	=	<i>id est</i> . ("that is. . ."; or "To put it another way. . ." "I love this car!!; i.e., "This car is slammin' !!")
incl.	=	including
NB.	=	Nota Bene (or "Note this well; pay attention to this")
p	=	punctuation
P.O.V.	=	Point-of-View / Opinion (may not be supported with evidence)

Qt.?	=	"Shouldn't this be in quotation marks?"
re.	=	regarding (e.g., "Re. your request for a higher grade")
ref.	=	refers to ? (i.e., what, or who, or when, or where)
sp.	=	spelling, as in incorrect spelling
ss	=	sentence structure (i.e., run-ons, incomplete sentences, subject-verb disagreements, etc.)
syn	=	syntax: word order, word choice, word usage
synon.	=	synonymous with (similar to; the same thing as saying. . .)
unc.	=	unclear
usu.	=	usually
via	=	"by way of" or "by means of" ("I went to Bolivia via Peru.")
vis.	=	abbrev. of "vis a vis" ("in relation to") E.g., "Can you make a generalization about the 19th c. economy vis. the entry of women into the industrial labor market?"
v. or vs.	=	versus; as against or opposed to (as in <u>People v. O. J. Simpson</u>)
v	=	verb is incorrect
vt	=	verb tense
w/	=	with
w/o	=	without (= "Rebel w/o a Cause," starring James Dean)
wd.?	=	Is this a word?
ww	=	wrong word
?	=	questionable item; review this statement, evidence
"	=	the same word(s) as the one immediately above
*, **	=	"see below, at bottom of page"; match to * or ** symbol below
TP	=	START A NEW PARAGRAPH AT THIS LOCATION
